Mayo GAA Senior A Hurling Final 2023 – Tyrell Cup

The residence of the TJ Tyrell Cup for the coming season will be decided this Saturday 21st October as neighbours Tooreen and Ballyhaunis go head-to-head in Ballyhaunis GAA Club. This years finals are a fortnight later than usual, so the weather may have even more of a bearing on the outcome than it has in previous years.

As expected, Tooreen have floated through the roundrobin section of this years Senior Hurling Championship with convincing wins over Castlebar, St Ciarans and todays opposition Ballyhaunis. In that opening round encounter between todays finalists, Ballyhaunis were down many of their regulars - and so will prove a much stronger opposition in todays decider. Tooreen are reigning Connacht Intermediate club champions and have improved steadily on last year as recent challenge games suggest. The loss of key marksman Cathal Freeman however to Australia could be a telling factor in the heat of championship battle, but with that a number of young Tooreen players have stepped up to the mark in recent months.

Mayo GAA Senior B Hurling Final 2023

This years sees the return of the Mayo GAA Senior B Hurling final after an absence of three years, as the St Ciarans Amalgamation and Castlebar do battle on Saturday 21st October at 3.30pm in Westport GAA Grounds. This competition was last competed for in 2020 when Westport overcame Castlebar after a penalty shoot-out.

The St Ciarans side will feature players from all seven of our Junior hurling sides in 2023, with clubs Caiseal Gaels, Moytura, Westport, Ballina, Ballyvary, Claremorris and Gaeltacht lorrais coming together to provide an extra dimension to this years SHC. This is the first year of the St Ciarans Senior side and has been a baptism of fire for the team and management thus far. Heavy defeats to Ballyhaunis and Tooreen haven't dampened the spirits of the side however, and Sean McGahon's charges go into this final knowing they are not far away from getting their first win at senior level. In their round-robin meeting last month, St Ciarans ran Castlebar to just four points, while the extra time together for the amalgamation outfit may help to bridge that gap. For Ballyhaunis, they will know they can raise their game and can put Tooreen to the pin of their collar on county final day. They were last

successful in the Senior Final in 2020, when they came away from Tooreen with a 1-15 to 1-12 win, and will be looking to repeat that ambush this weekend. New players Eamon Phillips and Michael Farrell will add extra firepower to the Ballyhaunis attack this year, in an effort to record the sides 14th county Senior Hurling title.

Today marks the first county Senior Hurling final for Ballyhaunis without their club general Pierce Higgins RIP. Pierse sadly passed away earlier in the year and was a stalwart of the hurling club throughout the past 25 years. The emotion of going to battle without their lost hero will generate an extra step in the Ballyhaunis camp, and may be the extra percentage needed to push the county champions all the way.

(Ballina), along with his Ballina team-mates are looking to add a SeniorB title to the JuniorA title they picked up earlier in the season, while Sean Mulroy (Ballyvary), Keelan & Michael Gallagher (both Westport) will need to bring their previous senior hurling championship experience to the table, if St Ciarans are to overcome their first round defeat to the Mitchel's.

For Castlebar Mitchel's, this year has been another learning block in their development at senior level. Their opening round win over St Ciarans was their first SHC win in a number of years, but losses to Tooreen and Ballyhaunis brought the county town side back to reality. Nevertheless, many young players have gained invaluable experience this year and will bring that commitment to county final day. Abbi Abbassi scored a hat-trick of goals against St Ciarans in September, and if let get a run on goal again, may prove the difference between the sides again. Winning the JuniorB Championship earlier this season proved positive for the Mitchel's, giving silverware to the club at adult level for the first time in recent years.



Tooreen Hurling Club – A Brief History

Tooreen Hurling club was formed in 1957, when a group of young men led by Michael Henry decided to form a dedicated hurling club. Monsignor James Horan was the first President of the club. The early years were difficult ones, and while the team achieved no success on the field, they consolidated and kept the club alive. After losing a County final in 1963, Tooreen won their first Senior Hurling championship in 1966, captained by the aforementioned Michael Henry.

After a few lean years at the end of the 1960s, Tooreen won their second County title in 1972, and this heralded a golden age for the club. Indeed Tooreen competed in every County final between 1972 and 2004, 33 successive finals, a remarkable record. Tooreen won 25 of these finals, including 10-in-a-row between 1978 and 1987, seven in-a-row from 1989 to 1995, and four successive titles from 1998 to 2000. In all they won 21 of the 23 finals played from 1978 to 2000. Tooreen also dominated underage hurling during this period, winning many county titles. In Connacht they competed annually in the Connacht Club championships, reaching finals on 11 occasions between 1974 and 1999. They also competed in the Kilmacud Crokes All-Ireland seven-a-aside championships, winning Shield titles in 1983 and 1990.

Many great hurlers played with Tooreen during this period, and like many rural clubs families made a big contribution – the Henrys, the Freemans, the Delaneys, and the Greallys among others. Joe Henry was recognised as one of the best hurlers in Ireland in the 1970s and 1980s, and he won three Railway Cup medals with Connacht, was twice selected as an All-Star replacement in 1979 and 1986, and was picked to represent the Rest of Ireland against All-Ireland champions Kilkenny in 1979. His brothers Vincent & Tony were also serial medal winners with Tooreen.

After 2000, the success dried up for Tooreen, as their neighbours Ballyhaunis emerged as kingpins in Mayo. After winning the 2003 championship, Tooreen had to wait ten years for their next title in 2013. Since then they have won further titles in 2017, 2018, 2019, 2021 and 2022, their 32th title since their first in 1966. They followed up their 2017 win by achieving Connacht success when they overcame Ballinderreen to win their first Connacht Intermediate Club championship. In the All-Ireland semi-final they lost out to St Patricks Ballyraggett. In 2019, Tooreen again won the Connacht Intermediate title, beating Kinvara in the final, before falling to Fr. O' Neills from Cork in the All-Ireland semi-final. 2020 and 2021 saw further Connacht titles, with Tooreen losing out to Naas in the 2020-21 All-Ireland Semi-Final, before earlier this year they made it all the way to Croke Park for the Final, where they lost a thrilling encounter to Monaleen of Limerick by 1-17 to 1-15 following a titanic battle.

Ballyhaunis Hurling Club – A Brief History

In the late 1920s, encouraged by men like Paddy Harty a Tipperary man, and a Garda Martin O'Connell hurling began in the parish and continued into the 30's with a lot of dual players such as Philip Morley, Pete Hannon (Lucan) and Garda Kennedy.

At this time the only hurling activity was when there were Garda and Bank clerks domiciled in the town but those were never long enough in the parish to pass on the skills and enthusiasm to the locals, never the less the club did win the Junior hurling championship in 1936, the team consisted of a mixture of Garda, teachers and locals.

Hurling matches were played from time to time in the 40's, 50's and 60's. Other players that have to be mentioned are Joe Webb (Tooraree), Michael Curley, Henry Madden, Thomas Lyons, Tony Gavin and Patsy Keane. In fact Tony Gavin played in Goals for the Connaught seniors and Thomas Lyons played in goal for the Mayo minors.

In the 50's a hurling club was formed in Tooreen and club members played their hurling with Tooreen, with great success and many of our players helped to make Tooreen the leading club in the county. As a

result of that success and the part that our players played in it, in the middle 80's the hurling aficionados decided that it was time for Ballyhaunis to branch out on its own and to promote hurling in the parish. As a result of the deliberations at the AGM of the club in 1988 a motion was proposed and passed to promote hurling in the club. The rest is history from that time on the club has amassed numerous county titles at under age and adult level.

The club won the junior title in 1999, the first adult title since 1936. The defining moment came in 2002 when the club won the senior hurling title defeating Tooreen in the final. Ballyhaunis have now won 13 Senior titles, the most being their 2020 success. There have being ups and downs over the years but hurling has gone from strength to strength in the club and great credit is due to the following for their foresight and enthusiasm they showed in the 80's, Peter Higgins, John Joe Hoban, john Joe Kelly and Jimmy Walsh. Recent success in the Nicky Rackard Cup under the captaincy of Keith Higgins and managed by Derek Walsh showcased the talent and progress of hurling in Mayo. Both Ballyhaunis and Tooreen players made up the majority of the Mayo winning team of 2021. Ballyhaunis will be looking to put an end to Tooreen's winning run in Finals this afternoon.
