While St Brigid's from Roscommon are a traditionally strong club, Corofin would be considered seasoned campaigners and yet St Brigid's came through to win our Senior Football title. They were worthy winners, too, while on the Intermediate side, Castlerea St Kevin's won a good Final against Monivea-Abbey, and Lahardane MacHales

claimed the Junior title in what was a very good match against Owenmore Gaels.

It was interesting to note across the competitions that you had some very entertaining matches in the Junior and Intermediate grades, with a more cautious approach at Senior level, which doesn't lend itself to spectator-friendly games. Perhaps one to ponder over the fire at Christmas time.

In the Connacht Intermediate Hurling Final, Tooreen won another title, for the third year in a row, and it's their fourth title successive title when you consider that they also won in 2019, prior to the Covid-19 pandemic. They beat Ballinderreen in a very good game, while Easkey won backto-back Junior titles and after reaching Croke Park this year, they're on the march again. That's a very decent spread of winners across the province and while Galway clubs missed out on the men's front, we have Kilkerrin-Clonberne preparing for an All-Ireland Ladies Senior Football Final, while Sarsfields will compete in the Camogie decider. Best wishes to both of them, while we have Ballinamore Sean O'Heslins and Claremorris ready for their All-Ireland Intermediate and Junior Club Football Finals, while Athleague will represent Roscommon and the province in the Junior camogie final. Best wishes to all teams competing and to our men's teams who will fly the flag in the AIB All-Ireland series in the New Year.

The Connacht Intermediate Football Final was the last game played in front of the iconic hayshed stand at Tuam Stadium. Dressing rooms were redeveloped there a couple of years ago and now it's time for the stand to go, which was well past its sell-by date, old and dilapidated. A donation of €350,000 from the late Joe and Helen O'Toole of O'Toole's, Tuam, who committed to supporting refurbishment works in 2018 is available to aid this project and the GAA can very grateful for that. The Association in general is now approaching a situation where stadia, such as Tuam, across the country, along with Centres of Excellence built ten or twelve years ago, now need to be sustained and that's a challenge. Venues in continuous use run down quicker than county grounds and that's something the GAA needs to be extremely careful about and any work into the future needs to be sustainable. I would stress.

Before I finish, I would like to wish readers a very Happy Christmas, while also expressing Connacht Council's pride in our success in the Inspirational Sustainable Energy Community Category at the recent SEAI awards. It's proof positive that we are doing a lot right and we have plenty more to look forward to in 2024.

Ryan Cup glory for University

RYAN CUP FINAL:

University of Galway0-15 Ulster University0-9

ONE of the coldest nights of the season greeted football followers to the GAA Centre in Abbottstown as old rivals UG and UU met once in the Ryan Cup final with UG emerging successful in bridging a 44-year gap since the 1979 success that was followed up the 1980 Sigerson/Fitzgibbon double for the college.

In recent seasons they met at the same stage and on that occasion, the Ulster kingpins were in the winner's enclosure. As is the norm unlike years previous both colleges were missing key players who will be featuring for their counties in the 2024 league and championship. However, those from both colleges who had worked hard to get their sides to this stage had the ideal opportunity to stake a place for Sigerson Cup action in mid-January. In the semi-finals, University of

Galway had too much for St Mary's Belfast whilst Ulster University edged past UL by the minimum to set up this eagerly awaited decider.

Wides were not in plentiful supply in Abbottstown as controlled play and indeed good accuracy once both sides got into the groove did ensure that a low-scoring first half did evolve into a positive second half albeit dominated in the main by the Western College. Clare man Mark McInerney opened the scoring for the Galway lads after seven minutes before the hardworking Danny Fullerton equalised for UU after 11 minutes.

Ryan O'Donoghue edged UG in front after 17 minutes, only for Rory Canavan to level moments later. Maigh Cuilinn midfielder James McLaughlin, who played an influential role in the second half, then replaced the injured Diarmuid Kilcommins and a defence-dominated opening half ended with Danny Fullerton adding two scores for UU before Cian Monaghan had the final score of the first half, leaving Ulster University ahead at half-time 0-4 to 0-3.

Two minutes into the second half Ryan Monaghan levelled the game and with Evan Lyons and Canice Mulligan dominating in the central defensive positions, UG began to take control. Ryan O'Donoghue, James McLaughlin and Tommy Conroy all landed superb points to put UG three ahead and even though Danny Fullerton pulled one back for UU, Ryan O'Donoghue kicked two more in the space of three minutes to leave UG 0-9 to 0-5 ahead by the end of the third quarter. A superb score from UU center-back Ryan McGill gave hope to Paul Rouse's men and Danny Fullerton did narrow the gap to two points soon after, but it was all University of Galway in the closing stages as the hardworking Liam O'Conghaile and McLaughlin once more were on target to leave UG 0-12 to 0-8 clear entering the final eight minutes.

Cian Monaghan and Rory Canavan traded points and the final two scores of the game went to UG substitutes Daniel O'Flaherty and Cillian O'Curraoin to seal a deserved six-point win. Best for the winners included Conor Corcoran, James

McLaughlin, Canice Mulligan, Rory Egan, Paul Kelly, Liam O'Conghaile, Ryan O'Donoghue, and the Monaghan brothers. Ulster University have players such as Conor Glass, Ethan Doherty and Darragh Canavan to bring back to the panel so it will be a far stronger side that they will bring to championship fare. Following the game chairperson of third-level GAA Michael Hyland, a native of Salthill, presented the Ryan Cup to University of Galway captain Cathal Sweeney.



Rather than focusing on the greatest players or intercounty teams, this book is about the other 99 percent. It is a witty and provocative look at grassroots GAA by a pundit who is also a passionate club player. This is the Life looks at the plight of clubs that are losing their players to big cities, and examines a world in which it's normal to cheer on your county's star players but then tog out alongside or

against them in a club game. The book also reflects on what it feels like to take to the field with your friends and neighbours and to try to squeeze one more year out of your ageing body!

Ciarán Murphy is an acclaimed podcaster with Second Captains and a columnist with the Irish Times. In his own words he is an 'ageing Gaelic footballer' originally with Milltown in Co. Galway and latterly with Templeogue Synge Street in Dublin. This is the Life is his first book. Connacht counties to the fore in Joe McDonagh awards

THE prestigious Fondúireacht Sheosaimh Mhic Dhonncha recognition awards were presented at a special ceremony in Croke Park on Friday night, 1 December 2023. This year 55 clubs from all over the country won bronze, silver or gold medals for their efforts, work and commitment for the promotion of the Irish language. Sports and entertainment broadcaster Gráinne McElwain presided over the ceremony and announced the 7 clubs that won Gold Medals, the 15 clubs that won Silver Medals and the 33 clubs that won Bronze Medals this year. Representatives from the clubs were present at Croke Park to proudly accept their awards, symbolising their dedication to promoting the Irish language both within their clubs and in their broader local communities.

Fondúireacht Sheosaimh Mhic Dhonncha is a collaborative initiative between Glór na nGael and the GAA. The partnership is dedicated to enhancing the presence and usage of the Irish language across GAA clubs nationwide. These medals serve as a testament to the clubs' ongoing efforts in integrating the Irish language into their activities and fostering its growth among their members and communities.

This event not only acknowledges individual club achievements but also reinforces the importance of preserving and promoting the Irish language through sport.

The event saw four Galway clubs being honoured for their outstanding contributions CLG Oileáin Árainn, Baile an Dóirín, Gaeil na Gaillimhe and Cumann Camogaíochta Cois Fharraige.

MAYO - The event saw three county Mayo clubs being honoured for their outstanding contributions. Kiltimagh GAA and Mayo Gaels were recognised with silver medals. Notably, Castlebar Mitchells achieved the distinction of being one of only seven clubs to receive a Gold Medal.

ROSCOMMON - The event saw one Roscommon club achieving a silver medal – a massive accomplishment – Cumann Phádraic Mhic Phiarais.

Galway and Mayo to kick off GAA GO coverage in 2024

GAAGO has announced at Croke Park its exclusive 2024 GAA Championship broadcast schedule, a new midweek show and the addition of seven-time hurling All-Star Richie Hogan to its analysis team.

Fans will access 38 live and ondemand matches in broadcast quality for a special pre-Christmas pass price of just €69 up until December 31st, before it moves to €79. Within the 38-game schedule twenty-two Sam Maguire cup, nine Liam Mac Carthy Cup and seven Tailteann Cup ('Game of the week') matches will be streamed.

The announcement comes after a successful inaugural season operating in the Irish market when a range of live matches that would not ordinarily have been shown to viewers were aired and

analysed by a stellar line-up of former players. The platform introduced a fresh player-led analysis to its content offering this season and its unique 'access all areas' presentation style will return in 2024.

Individual pay-per-game matches will be available for €12, a '3-for-2' bundle deal will cost €24 and GAA members will receive 10% off any full price (€79) subscription. GAA clubs will be able to avail of a group pass for €150 and caregiving locations will again watch for free using complimentary login codes.

Live coverage from all six provincial championships as well as extensive All-Ireland series football championship action will be brought to viewers in Ireland and around the world for 19 match days across

13 weekends. Exclusive coverage begins on April 6/7th in Ruislip and Gaelic Park as Galway and Mayo travel to play London and New York respectively.

Defending hurling and football champions Limerick and Dublin will feature across the match schedule, as will four provincial football semi-finals including Kerry's tie against either Cork or Limerick on April 20th. Cork's Munster hurling championship round 3 clash against Limerick is also included in the line-up. The platform will carry nine Munster and Leinster hurling round robin matches, all four All-Ireland series football preliminary quarterfinals and two All-Ireland series football quarter-finals.

Like 2023, GAAGO coverage will include full outside broadcast treatment for



nearly 30 games with live presentation, panel analysis and multi-camera setup. In addition to the full match production, ingame digital highlights will be distributed to fans across GAAGO's social media channels for the first time and a new midweek show will also provide more insight and debate during the Championship (more details to follow).

Multiple access points will play a key role in the service's 2024 distribution strategy with virtually all internet-enabled devices being supported by GAAGO.ie and iOS or Android apps enabling casting to a TV screen. Fans may also enjoy accessing GAAGO directly on TVs via Apple TV, Amazon Fire TV, Google TV, ROKU or connected Samsung and LG smart TVs.

Speaking at a GAAGO match schedule launch event, Larry McCarthy, Uachtarán Chumann Lúthchleas Gael, said "We are delighted to confirm the 2024 schedule for GAAGO and some enhancements to the offering including the addition of Richie Hogan to an already stellar line up of analysts and the very welcome addition of a new midweek GAA programme to complement the weekend coverage.

"We have worked hard to strike the balance between those games which will be shown by our broadcast partners RTÉ and BBC and those which will be shown on GAAGO. It's worth re-stating, if these games were not broadcast by GAAGO, they would not be available to view anywhere.

National Hurling Action plan to grow hurling nationwide

THE GAA Strategic Plan - Áontas 2022-2026 commits to growing Hurling as a key objective for the Association. The creation of a National Hurling Action Plan is designed to support this objective and expedite the growth and development of hurling across the country.

A National Hurling Action Plan Workgroup has been established and held their first meeting on Saturday, 2nd December. The Workgroup is chaired by Colm Nolan of Maynooth GAA and includes personnel from all tiers of hurling. To understand the challenges facing hurling, it is imperative that the Workgroup is made up of players, administrators, coaches and staff from counties from across hurling and includes representation from the Camogie Association.

Following on from the first meeting of the Workgroup on Saturday, a survey has been created to allow all those interested in the game to have a say

on how hurl-

ing might be grown and developed. Responses will be factored into the key goal of agreeing a three-year action plan for the growth of the game.

This survey is open until Friday 15th December at 5pm.

Welcoming the formation of the group. Uachtarán CLG Larry McCarthy said: "The formation of this group has been in process since late summer and to ensure that the Association can put in place a series of actions to develop the game of hurling, it is important that those involved are reflective of all the tiers of hurling. As an Association, it is important that any actions coming out of this plan are realistic and I am delighted with the composition of the Workgroup. All are passionate about the development of hurling, and I look forward to their recommendations. It is also important that we work alongside the Camogie Association, as we face similar challenges and can support each other in creating new opportunities to grow our games.

The purpose of the Hurling Development Plan Workgroup is to facilitate the formulation of a three-year action plan to sustain and grow Hurling in line with the overarching vision and goals set out in the GAA Strategic Plan - Áontas 2022-2026 and in accordance with the following terms

of reference:

- Conduct a review of the findings and recommendations of previous plans, reports, action statements on the game over the past 15 years.
- Conduct a review and analysis of current hurling activity at Club, Primary, Post Primary, Higher Education and Inter-County levels across all tiers of the game but with a special focus on the game in Joe MacDonagh, Christy Ring,

Nickey Rackard and Lory Meagher counties.

- 3. Review the current Hurley and Helmet Scheme.
- 4. Consult with key stakeholders as required.
- Work with Camogie Association identify areas/projects of common interest and cooperation for inclusion in the plan.
- 6. Explore and identify ways in which the Camogie Association, the GAA can maximise the UNESCO Intangi-

- ble Cultural Heritage status for the games of camogie and hurling in supporting the implementation of the plan.
- Produce a plan for presentation to Central Council on its findings, recommendations, and a roadmap for implementation.

Whelan claims All-Star award for Galway

GALWAY hurler and PhD candidate Conor Whelan is concerned that student athletes are being driven away from Gaelic games due to excessive demands on their time.

Whelan is a qualified secondary school teacher who is currently doing a full-time PhD on third-level student well-being, having completed a master's in psychology last year.

He is specifically looking at GAA student athletes and how they "balance 40 hours of academia with another 20-30 hours of sporting commitments."

"I've noticed that players are coming to the age of 18, 19 and packing it up," he told 2fm's Game On. "Seventeen to 19year-olds are the highest rate of dropout across sport in Ireland.

"The game has gone very physical and there's a major emphasis put on S&C but I think sometimes it is overkill. There is any amount of strength and conditioning, gym sessions and running sessions. As a voung lad it was all about plaving the game and enjoying it. I'm not so sure where it's going, particularly at younger age groups.

"Some players I've looked at are playing for five teams, between Fitzgibbon or Sigerson, senior and U20 club and county.

"If you feel like it's a tough slog all the time, it's very difficult for people to stay going. Enjoying your sport, at whatever

age you are, I think is the most important thing of all. That's what keeps you going and keeps you coming back."

Whelan, who recently turned 27, feels that student athletes of his era at least had the first few months of the academic year to enjoy college life.

"I've been very vocal on not having the GAA as your sole identity and having different outlets," he said.

"When I came through we used to get November and most of December off [from sport]. You were guaranteed to get a semester in college and that was enough to enjoy yourself and then go back.

"I was part of a group competing for Leinster and All-Irelands so I was very privileged but I think it would be harder now. If you're a young kid, going to college and starting to making friends, and you're having to choose whether to stay in or go out and enjoy yourself, it's probably a no-brainer why younger people are falling away."

The Kinvara man noted that it's not just students who are in need of a break from the demands of modern hurling.

"Seeing the likes of Austin Gleeson, a major talent, step away, that's very sad for the sport. There are lots of others. Chris Crummey is out in Australia as well, Paudie Foley from Wexford. That would indicate there is a problem there.

"I'm not so sure the split-season is working as well as people say it does. I've seen the likes of Conor Cooney and Shane Cooney going for 12 months

straight [with St Thomas'].

'The round-robin could be tweaked a bit, to let players take some down time after games. The league is not being treated with the respect I think it deserves because teams are looking at the roundrobin and saying they can't go as hard.

"I think overall hurling is in a pretty decent place but student athletes are a group that need to be looked after."

Following a brilliant 2023 season. Whelan was selected at corner forward on the PwC Hurling All Star team.

In 2017, Whelan started at at right corner-forward when they won their first All-Ireland in 29 years after a 0-26 to 2-17 defeat of Waterford in the final.

He ended the season by winning an All-Star award as well as being named Young Hurler of the Year.

Iconic hayshed stand at Tuam



WORKS to demolish the iconic hayshed stand at Tuam Stadium have commenced.

The Connacht Club IFC final between Castlerea St Kevin's and Monivea-Abbey was the last game to be played under the old stand.

The roof on the stand is to be replaced as part of a major revamp which has been made possible thanks to a donation of €350,000 from the late Joe and Helen O'Toole of O'Toole's Tuam, who committed to supporting the refurbishment in 2018.

Crowds huddled under the old 'hay shed' roof for the last time before the latest phase of the work to improve the venue got underway.

The old roof will be replaced by a new steel-framed cantilever roof while an upgrade of seating for 1,500 spectators is also being undertaken.

The stand has been in place, in its present form, since 1958 and has played host to crowds for numerous Connacht football finals, most recently Mayo's dethroning of then Connacht and All-Ireland champions Galway in 1999.

When Galway won their All-Ireland three-in-a-row in the 1960s, the 1964 and 1965 Connacht finals, against Mayo and Sligo, were both played in Tuam Stadium with an estimated 30,000 attending the 1964 final.

In recent years a terrace has been constructed with some financial support from the company of the late Tommy Varden, who was Galway's main sponsor when they won their All-Ireland football titles in 1998 and 2001. The terrace is now named after him.

Separate to the roof and seating overhaul, further work, funded in part by a Sports Capital grant, will see dressingrooms, a referees' room and other facilities developed.

Tuam Stadium has not been as prominent since Galway redeveloped Pearse Stadium in Salthill in the early 2000s but it is still a hub for many local football championship games, provincial underage intercounty games and will invariably host at least one game in Galway's league programme.

Galway spend close to €2.5m on team preparation

GALWAY, which last year became the first county to spend over €2m on the preparation of their teams, has seen spending this season soar close to €2.5m.

But despite the spend of an extra €288,238 on Galway inter-county teams, the county still shows a profit of €367,430 for the year.

A total of €2,449,735 was spent on the six Galway teams, most of which was spent on Padraic Joyce's senior footballers and Henry Shefflin's senior hurlers.

The breakdown of the spend will be presented to delegates at next Monday's Galway annual convention.

The amount spent does not include €191,010 which was spent on a team holiday for the Galway senior footballers which they recently went on, in recognition of reaching last year's All-Ireland final.

Galway chairman Paul Bellew, who has led a restructuring of the GAA in the county in the past few years, has consistently stated they will not skimp on funding their players, teams and facilities and increased funding will be found to finance them.

To that end, income in Galway in 2023

jumped by over €1.3m to €5,869,684.

Expenditure has also increased by over €1.3m, leaving an overall profit of €367,430 which is down by €43,000 on last year's surplus.

A big drive on fundraising — Galway are currently raffling a house — has seen a big rise in income and expenditure in this sector with the profits set to boost next year's figures, while sponsorship increased from €700,613 to €824,594.

Gate receipts for club matches in Galway has again topped €1.1m during the year, while income from the live streaming of club games has jumped from €98,798 to €257,963.

Galway star Walsh guides Kilmacud to more glory

GALWAY star Shane Walsh led the way as Kilmacud Crokes became the first side to capture three successive Leinster senior club football title when they pulled away in the closing stages to defeat Naas by 1-14 to 0-10 at Croke Park. Walsh, who has now won two Dublin and Leinster medals and an All-Ireland title since his move from his native Kilkerrin-Clonberne last year, shot 1-8, which included five frees.

In the process the Dublin champions join St Vincent's and Portlaoise at the top of the roll of honour with seven Leinster titles and they will now turn their attentions to retaining their All-Ireland club crown.

It was a disappointing conclusion for a Naas side who were only a point adrift going into the closing eleven minutes but they did not score again as they fell for the third year to Kilmacud in the Leinster championship.

The sides were level three times in the opening half but Kilmacud Crokes got an edge and led by 0-9 to 0-7 at the break.

Naas, bidding for a first Leinster title after completing a three-in-a-row in Kildare when they won their eleventh county title, cut the gap to the minimum when their two main scoring threats, Alex Byrne and Darragh Kirwan, pointed after Walsh had landed another free.

Walsh and Paul McDermott exchanged points to leave it 0-11 to 0-10 after 49 minutes but that was as close as Naas got and they didn't score again despite a couple of good goal chances.

Kilmacud, with Dublin's Craig Diaz winning some key ball, pushed the lead out to three points with a couple of Walsh points before Rory O'Carroll curled over the insurance score in stoppage time.

The day finished badly for Naas when their best player Byrne picked up a second yellow card and Kimacud countered from deep for Walsh to shoot into an empty net in the dying moments.

In a statement issued by Mayo GAA, the 31-year-old Aghamore man confirmed his retirement after various injuries which reduced his involvement with Mayo to six league and one championship appearance since 2020.

He made his Mayo senior debut in the National Football League against Kildare and played 67 times for the county, including 32 championship games.

He contributed 0-5 points from play for Mayo during his playing career and forged a reputation as a stylish and teak-tough defender.

Harrison also played Minor and Under-21 for Mayo and played key roles in the All-Ireland senior finals in 2016 and

2017 and in the Allianz National Football League final in 2019.

He was a member of five Connacht winning football panels with Mayo - 2013, 2014, 2015, 2020 and 2021 - and won a PwC All-Star in 2016 at right corner-back. Harrison was also nominated for an All-Star in 2017 and made two appearances for Ireland against Australia in the International Rules Series in the same year.

His last game for Mayo was also against Kildare in the Allianz National Football League in Carrick-on-Shannon in

In a statement, Harrison described playing for Mayo as something he 'always treasured.'

"From the very first day I pulled on the jersey at underage level, I was conscious of the honour it was to wear the green and red. I played alongside brilliant players and under outstanding management teams and I thank each and every one of them for everything they did," he said.

"I had my problems with injuries over the past five seasons and while that was frustrating, I look back on my time with Mayo with very happy memories. Injuries mean that I cannot continue to train at the required level. I thank my club Aghamore and my local community of Kilkelly for their support at all stages and my wife Natasha and my entire family who made many sacrifices so that I could play for Mayo.



Conroy looks ahead to new year with college and county

TOMMY Conroy watched the 2024 Sigerson Cup Final draw in Croke Park like a hawk.

Now in his final year in the University of Galway, this is his last opportunity to win one of the most coveted medals in Gaelic games.

He already has one from 2022, but the Mayo star doesn't quite feel like he won it because he tore his cruciate ligament in the quarter-final of the competition that year.

"It was brilliant to win but it was tough at the same time looking on from the sideline," says Conroy.

"Terrific win, but it is my final year in Sigerson and it would be nice to win one on the pitch, even though I have the medal. When you are not playing in the final or semi-final it's slightly bittersweet."

That knee injury put paid to Conroy's 2022 season, but after a year back now playing for club, county, and college, his career is very much back on track again.

"Thank god, touch wood it's feeling great now and i don't really think about it anymore, I've built that confidence again," he says.

"I think gradually throughout the season more so than anything, the confidence just starts coming back.

"Even just in training like, we have some really good defenders so when you are marking some of them in training, it really tests you.

"By the time you get back into playing games, you kind of know you are ready."

Conroy thinks his enforced break from the game might ultimately have done him some good. He came back feeling fresher and with a renewed appetite for playing football at the highest level.

"I suppose it kind of gives you that step back from the intensity of kind of going from training session to training session all the time especially when you are 21, 22, you are playing with so many teams as well.

"There is very little time to step back from sport. It did give me that bit of breathing space.

"I think the big thing I took away from it was how privileged you are to be playing at the highest level, because once it's all taken away from you, you kind of

realise how cool it is to be playing football at the highest level. It's only really when you step back and you start missing it, that's when it starts dawning on you."

Conroy started back training with Mayo last weekend and is looking forward to trying to right some of the wrongs of an up and down 2023 season that saw them beaten heavily by Dublin in the All-Ireland SFC Quarter-Final.

"We were definitely disappointed at the end of the season," he says.

"I suppose looking back on it, we were going really well in the League.

"Disappointed against Roscommon. I think we regrouped really well after that. Went into the Kerry game down in Killarney, done really well down there, done okay against Louth.

"I think the big slip up really was we didn't finish well against Cork, lost that game and that put us in a tough position I suppose to approach the rest of the season. We had to play three games in three weekends.

"That probably made it tough on ourselves. We have definitely a lot of learning to take from last year.

"There are a lot of younger lads there too that will be that bit more experienced this year.

"So, yeah, I think we will hopefully go into the year a bit stronger."

Conroy relishing Lahardane MacHales journey

EDDIE CONROY laughs about the madness of it all. Football is always on the agenda. Just when Conroy thought he might get a break from sport, Lahardane MacHales hooked him back in.

Not that Conroy needed too much persuading. There was just something about Lahardane that appealed to him.

"They got me involved, I don't know how, I was humming and hawing, then I said I'd give it a go, that is where we are now," he remarks. "You have to enjoy these days and to enjoy life, as much as you can. This is just another one of these days that you will enjoy."

Conroy and Lahardane have connected. "It probably is a good fit," he acknowledged ahead of the AIB Connacht Club JFC Final against Sligo's Owenmore Gaels at Hastings Insurance MacHale Park.

"I liked the way when I was talking to the chairman Derek Sheridan - the way he was talking, I said I'd give it one year, to see how we go. I didn't know anything about them.

"All I knew was that they went down from intermediate last year. After Christmas I met the lads, we had a plan going forward what we would do. It just clicked after the league. When the league was over we clicked together.

"We had a plan in place, we said the league didn't go the way we wanted, let us just focus on championship. Every team is like that. When the league is over, you concentrate on your championship. That is what we did and it is where we are now."

Conroy has relished the Lahardane adventure. "I played football for Breaffy, I'm originally from Charlestown, I played senior football with Charlestown," he explains.



"I left Charlestown early and I was then with Breaffy. I spent longer with Breaffy than Charlestown, where I played all my underage football. I played one year senior and I moved to Castlebar after that and joined Breaffy. Then Lahardane came calling, so I've three clubs now that I'm attached to."

Two decades ago Conroy featured in a successful campaign for Breaffy at this level. "We were junior when I joined, Charlestown were senior," he recalls. "I was going giving up football until Breaffy came calling.

"I stuck with Breaffy right up until I was 44, I played adult football right up until I

was 44. With Breaffy we won the junior and intermediate one year after one another. Breaffy haven't gone down since once we went senior."

In recent times Conroy has been a key figure in Mayo Masters teams. "I played right up until this year, I'm 48, but I said it was my last year playing football," he chuckles. "I did my shoulder in my last game, so I said I'm finished with playing staying on the sideline. It might be easier, but it isn't easier."

Conroy, though, has still found a way. Football peppers the conversations in Mayo, but in Lahardane there is a real sense of optimism once more. "It is great



any time you get to a final, especially for a small community like Lahardane," Conroy comments.

"It is a tight knit community, so it is great for them to look forward to another day out. That is all we are looking at, it is another big day out for them."

Following a relegation it can be a demanding time for a club. Undoubtedly it was a challenge to get Lahardane motoring again, to instil belief and generate momentum. "It is very hard," Conroy responds.

"I've seen many a team struggle. I said to the boys that it is very hard when you go down, you can get stuck down for three or four years before you get out of it. So, it was a thing that was in my head, if we were going to do it, we were going to do it this year.

"We've done it, we've came out of the junior, but it is very hard. Even for players, to motivate themselves, thinking do we give it another year to get back up.

"In fairness, we held off training until April and that has kinda stood to us in the later stage. We didn't start training until April and I think that has benefited us more than anything else. We seem that bit more sharper."

Through winning matches and having fixtures on the agenda the winter is being shortened. "Christmas is around the corner, and you are thinking are we still playing football?," Conroy says enthusiastically.

"When we were training the last night I was saying t the boys, who would have said at the beginning of April that we'd be still training at the end of November?

"You take it. There isn't many teams out there still training in November so we are lucky in a way, that we are still involved in a competition. I think it is great.

"You have two teams left in Connacht, somebody has to lose at the weekend, but it is a great achievement to get where we are after what happened last year."

Opportunities to perform on the Castlebar stage must be relished. Playing games against unfamiliar opposition in the province adds another layer of intrigue. "There is a big excitement," Conroy admits.

"At senior level everybody is trying to cancel each other out. At junior level you are trying to see what they do or who are their best players? At the end of the day, you just have to mark up with who you have.

"I think they just have to go out to enjoy themselves more than any other team. That is my motto, the next day, to just go out, enjoy it, hope for the best. If it works out, it works out.

"If it doesn't, we are unbeaten in Mayo for the year and we got to a Connacht final, that is a great achievement for the lads."

That approach has worked nicely for Conroy and Lahardane MacHales.

ENDA SMITH has become Roscommon's first All-Star since 2001.

Smith was named on the 2023 PwC selection at left half forward – the only Connacht player on the annual 15.

He is the first All-Star from the county since Francie Grehan from St. Aidan's was chosen at centre-back in 22 years ago.

He becomes the 12th Roscommon player to win an All-Star, following in the footsteps of Mickey Freyne (1972), Dermot Earley (1974, 1979), Pat Lindsay (1977), Harry Keegan (1978, 1980, 1986), Danny Murray (1979, 1980), Tom Heneghan (1979), Gerry Connellan (1980), Paul Earley (1985), Tony McManus (1989), Enon Gavin (1991) and Francie Grehan (2001).

Smith has since revealed how a change of heart at the last minute may well have saved his career over 16 months ago.

The Boyle player revealed that he was just about to board a plane to the USA at Dublin Airport in July 2022 in the aftermath of Roscommon's defeat to Clare in the All-Ireland qualifiers when he had to turn back on the advice of Dr. Martin Daly.

"I had my bags put through. I was through security heading for US customs. I had a scan on (an injury) the Monday, and this was the Thursday. Then I saw the phone ringing. It was Martin Daly.

"We had a bit of small chat. Then he told me that I couldn't go to America. I had a stress fracture in my pelvis. He made it very clear that things would not end well if I went over and played football on it.

"I was caught between two stools. I had told the club over there that I was going. But I turned around and came back. I suppose I went with my gut instinct, but I was in bits. If you saw me in the airport at that moment, you'd think that something shocking had happened to me," he recalled.

THE Roscommon senior football camp has suffered a triple-whammy with the loss of selector/coach Mark McHugh and two of their regular starters, Conor Daly and Cian McKeon, for the coming season.

McHugh, an All-Ireland-winner with Donegal in 2012, won't be involved in the Rossies' management team as Davy Burke embarks on his second year at the helm.

The Roscommon Herald reported the story, citing a Roscommon GAA spokesperson who confirmed that McHugh wasn't in a position to be part of the 2024 set-up because of the travel commitments involved.

The 2012 All Star was a key member of Burke's management team as they finished third in Division 1 and ambushed Mayo in Connacht before eventually

succumbing to Cork in an All-Ireland SFC preliminary quarter-final.

Another outgoing selector, former Sligo footballer Gerry McGowan, had already departed the fold. His place has been filled by Lar Wall, who led The Downs to last year's Westmeath SFC title and a Leinster club final appearance against Kilmacud.

Meanwhile, the Herald revealed that Daly and McKeon are heading to Australia for the foreseeable future, while quoting Burke as saying the door will remain open for a return if they come back to Ireland in the short term.

On a more positive note, Ultan Harney and Ronan Daly (brother of Conor and Niall) are due to return home in the coming weeks and will then rejoin the inter-county fold. Both players missed the past season after venturing overseas.

Family affair for Sligo star Duffy

IT WILL very much be a family affair for Leah Duffy when she attempts to secure a Connacht LGFA Intermediate Club Championship title in the colours of Eoghan Rua against Ballinamore Sean O'Heslins of Leitrim at Markievicz Park later today (throw-in 1pm).

A regular starter for Sligo throughout 2023, the TUS Athlone student is the daughter of former inter-county referee Marty Duffy. A member of the GAA's National Referees panel for several years, he took charge of the All-Ireland senior men's football championship decider between Munster rivals Kerry and Cork in 2009.

Although he has served as chairperson of the Connacht referees committee and the referees' appointments committee since hanging up his whistle in 2017, the past few years has also seen Marty maintaining a passion that long preceded his time on the inter-county scene.

Since its early inception as an LGFA club for players from Castle-connor, Enniscrone and Easkey, he has been heavily involved with the aforementioned Eoghan Rua.

When they won the 2020
Connacht LGFA junior crown
at the expense of Galway's
Naomh Mhuire – in a final
that was actually played in
June 2021 – Marty was one of
the team's selectors, while Leah started at
left half-forward and amassed a personal
haul of 2-3. The father-daughter combo
remain in these respective roles over two
years later and will be hoping for another
provincial success later this afternoon.

"He's one of the coaches. He's not the main man, but he's there and it's very special being there with him. I just take his advice more than anyone and I love going home, and having a chat with him. Analysing everything with him," Leah explained.

"He's been in and out of Eoghan Rua since the very beginning, since they started up. I think when they started up he was one of the main guys there. Throughout the years, from coming up from U12, and even when I was playing with the Rua have defied the odds to a certain extent. Viewed as outsiders heading into a Sligo intermediate championship show-piece with Drumcliffe-Rosses Point, they survived a late rally from their opponents to record a 3-13 to 3-10 victory.

Similarly, Eoghan Rua were expected to be up against it when facing Salthill/Knocknacarra in a Connacht IFC semi-final last Sunday week – given their counterparts enjoyed a clean sweep of junior club silverware in 2022 and went on to claim second-tier honours within

Galway this year.

boys U10s or whatever, he'd be involved. Everyone loves having him around. He's a great coach, in fairness to him."

In addition to her father,
Duffy's uncle Michael was also a
highly-regarded GAA referee in the
past. He was in the middle for Kerry's AllIreland U21 football final triumph against
Kildare in 2008 and the All-Ireland minor
football showpiece between Tyrone and
Cork two years later.

Michael's sons Brian and Gavin have also represented Sligo on the playing field in recent years and they are all expected to cheer on Leah when she takes to the pitch for today's final.

"We are a very proud family and we're such a GAA-based family. My cousins and everything are playing with Sligo. These big occasions, my family just love it. Everyone is involved and my aunt and uncles, and everybody will be there. We're a very proud family and we're a very supportive family," Leah said.

By progressing to this current stage of the club championship, Duffy and Eoghan their own abilities and finished with two points to spare (2-13 to 1-14) in an enthralling encounter that went all the way to extratime in Salthill.

Yet the West Sligo

"We saw what they had done in the junior last year. We know that they were probably favourites going into Sunday, but I think almost going in as underdogs, it helped us a lot. I don't think anyone was expecting us to come out on top.

"It definitely encouraged us more, we'd almost have a point to prove. I think they were meant to be favourites for the intermediate. It definitely encouraged us more than anything to kick on and to upset the competition a bit.

"I think even in Sligo, I don't think people would have expected [us to win]. We're West Sligo, we're smaller than a lot of the clubs in Sligo town and I just don't think people would have expected us to come out with that result on the day [against Drumcliffe-Rosses Point]. We just love upsetting the bigger teams. It encourages us more and drives us on."

Whereas their game with Salthill\Knocknacarra went right down to the wire, Ballinamore Sean O'Heslins come into today's fixture on the back of an emphatic 4-12 to 1-9 win over Mayo's

MacHale Rovers in the competition's other semi-final. That said, Duffy is hopeful that coming through a tighter contest will stand to Eoghan Rua once the ball is thrown in for a novel occasion at the home of Sligo GAA.

"It's not every day that you have a Sligo/Leitrim Connacht final either. I'm hoping maybe that because we had the tight game and we had the extra-time, that we might just have that bit of an upper hand when things do get tight in the final. Definitely both teams are going to be

coming in swinging, so we'll see."

When you consider she played Sligo's opening game in Division 3 of the Lidl National Football League against Clare back on January 22 – and was a mainstay for the Yeats County in the months that followed – it has been a year of non-stop action for Duffy. There is every chance her season could be extended into December if Eoghan Rua can make it beyond the provincial club championship, but she has been more than happy to put her shoulder to the wheel.

"It was very full on this year, between club and county. It was quite hard at times. There was a few times where I wondered what the hell I was doing! It is hard work and especially coming into the winter months, it is hard work, but it is worth it in the end," Duffy added.



A LOCKDOWN defensive display from Brian Stack and 1-07 from Ben O'Carroll at the other end of the pitch were the key ingredients for St. Brigid's as they recorded their fifth ever AIB Connacht senior club football title, and their first since 2012.

On that occasion, the Kiltoom and Cam club went on to win their one and only All-Ireland and they'll be considered as strong contenders to do the same again this time around, based on the quality of this display.

The 1-6 to 1-2 interval lead for the Roscommon champions only served to flatter Corofin, who registered their goal through Liam Silke with the last play of

the half to give themselves a lifeline.

A seven-point lead would have only been a fair reflection of St. Brigid's dominance, which stemmed from their outstanding man on man defending in front of goal. Aside from Brian Stack taking control of his battle with Sice, Pearse Frost was outstanding up against Jack McCabe, who was man of the match in the semi-final between Corofin and Castlebar, while Robbie Dolan was also very effective on both sides of the ball, winning several turnovers.

The home supporters started to believe that a good day was in store when Ben O'Carroll fired in a penalty in the 12th minute, capitalising on a foul on Alan Daly by Bernard Power. Corofin replied with a thunderous shot from Conor Cunningham that crashed off the cross bar, following up with a couple of points to cut the five point lead to three, 1-2 to 0-2. However St. Brigid's took over again in the second quarter, with O'Carroll adding most of their scores

Silke's goal gave Corofin cause for hope and they were rejuvenated after half-time, with Patrick Egan and Conor Cunningham playing well while Kieran Molloy gave them a jolt of energy off the bench. The Galway side were back within a point when after eight minutes of the second half a long spell of possession down the left ended with Michael Farragher setting up Dylan McHugh on the run, and the Corofin wing back duly added the final touch with a clever and accurate flick of the ball in the air.

That would have tested the resolve of many teams, but St. Brigid's only got better from then on, and they added five of the next six points to establish a commanding lead once more. Brian Stack rounded off a stellar defensive display with a point of his own and another powerful run that set up a Ciarán Sugrue score, while O'Carroll and Ruaidhrí Fallon added further points from play to conclude a memorable afternoon for the South Roscommon side, who now advance to

top in Connacht

an All-Ireland semi-final clash with the Munster champions.



McCabe for cheeky chip pick-ups and praising him for fisting over points than trying to go for goals, the 19-year old turned in a remarkable display.

He landed five points from play, shooting off both feet and racing through to punch two keys scores just when Ballina were rallying in the second-half, in what is turning out to be a superb debut season at senior level for a forward who featured for the Galway U-20s this year and is on Padraic Joyce's radar.



weeks ago," said McCabe. "Eight years ago I would have been in sixth class looking up at the Gary Sices, Daithi Burkes, Ronan Steedes and these lads and now for me making it into the team it's a privilege to be honest. Two pointed frees from Sice and one apiece from captain Dylan McHugh and midfielder Patrick Egan — another youngster making a huge impression — pushed Corofin 0-4 to 0-0 in front before Frank Irwin opened Ballina's account at the end of the opening quarter.

Wing-back McHugh and Egan again went forward for points as Corofin built a six points interval advantage, although Evan Regan gave the Mayo champions hopes when he landed his third free less than a minute after the restart.

Ballina managed to get the gap down to a goal with over ten minutes remaining but McCabe killed the contest when he burst through and both times fisted a point.

"Maybe I could have gone for goal but we probably needed the points as they had just got a few scores so I tapped them over and kept the scoreboard ticking over," added McCabe. "The lads out the field did all the hard work and the ball coming in was excellent."

Jordan Reynolds squeezed over a point from a tight angle before Ben O'Carroll replied with a free in the closing minutes of the first half, but such was the strength of the breeze that it was St. Brigid's who would have been marginally the happier team at the interval.

With Cormac Sheehy directing kickouts very well and Mohill struggling to

create and convert chances into the breeze, St. Brigid's were comfortably the better team in the second half, even allowing for their poor accuracy. Four of their first five shots of the second half went astray with Ronan Stack the only one to hit the target, but they looked to have established a winning position when Brian Derwin fisted the ball over the bar from close range and then they scored the game's only goal, Ciarán Sugrue applying the finish after a slick move up the pitch that started with Bobby Nugent fielding another laser-like kickout from Sheehy.

A majestic strike from Domhnaill Flynn in reply was Mohill's first point of the second half but Brigid's handled that setback well, and points in reply from John Cunningham and Bobby Nugent left them five points up with ten minutes to play.

Suddenly, the momentum of the contest shifted decisively, as Flynn and Conor Quinn took over at midfield, while an uncharacteristic element of chaos and panic crept into St. Brigid's play.

Quinn found the target in the 56th minute, Ronan Kennedy finished off a spell of pinball close to the St. Brigid's goal with a hooked kick to reduce the gap to a goal, and the stage was set for a dramatic finale when Keith Beirne struck his fourth point in the first minute of stoppage time.

Brian Stack's emergence off the bench despite his injury last week was a sign of the nervousness of the St. Brigid's side and the South Roscommon club had to deal with a couple of high balls into their full back line in the closing minutes, but none of those yielded the goal chance that Mohill needed to secure what would have been their first ever win in the Connacht senior club football championship.

"We find ourselves in a Connacht final and we are going to look forward to it." Originally from Charlestown but



synonymous for his years spent playing with Breaffy and Mayo's over-40s team, Eddie Conroy admitted to being wary of the threat that will be posed next time out by Sligo champions Owenmore Gaels.



Easkey claim another Connacht Junior Club Hurling title

Easkey (Sligo)1-18 Ballinasloe (Galwav)2-12

EASKEY hurlers have retained their Connacht Junior Hurling crown after a big battle with Galway's Ballinasloe in Bekan.

The Sligo champions, who reached the All-Ireland final in January 2023, put in a polished display but Ballinasloe kept fighting and a mere goal separated the sides at the full-time whistle in front of a big crowd at the Connacht Centre of Excellence.

The Sea Blues, despite their eldest player being 26, showed great maturity on the pitch and frustrated their opponents, freetaker Andy Kilcullen hitting 1-11 including a penalty with Finnian Cawley, back from injury, putting in a huge performance throughout the hour and hitting three of his side's scores.

It was Ballinasloe that got off to the better start with their freetaker Cathal O'Hanlon getting his first of seven after an early free on two minutes. John Coughlan added with a huge point from play as it was a good start from the Galway side.

Cawley got Easkey off the mark with a fantastic point on four minutes, O'Hanlon again converting a free down the other end on eight minutes. Kilcullen hit his first from a placed ball a minute later. O'Hanlon again adding a free on 12 minutes as moments later Ballinasloe had a goal chance, Evan Hayes with a superb pass to Coughlan whose effort skirted to the left hand side and out wide.

Kilcullen added another free midway through the half and then a great ball in saw Joe McHugh's goal chance tipped out for a '65, Kilcullen doing the honours at it was level at four points each.

Another good ball in to the full-forward line saw Kilcullen bundled to the ground and referee James Judge awarded the penalty, converted by Kilcullen as Easkey took the lead for the first time.

O'Hanlon added another free for a push on Michilin Fogarty as Aodhan Connaughton added a super score from play as it was back to a one point game on 24 minutes.

The midfield pairing of Mikey Gordon and Finnian Cawley were winning a lot of possession for Easkey as it was end to end stuff.

Fogarty with a point from play brought the game level with Easkey defending another chance. Gordon set up Cawley

A good move involving Fionn Moylan set up Thomas Cawley for his first of two to loud cheers from the Easkey support as halftime approached. They extended their lead with Rory McHugh on target and a Kilcullen free after Joe McHugh was fouled. Easkey had a goal chance saved by the Ballinasloe keeper just before the break as they were in front by five at the interval, Easkey 1-9 Ballinasloe 0-7.

Ballinasloe needed a goal to get back into the game and shortly after the resumption they did just that. A dangerous ball in being flicked to the net by Evan Hayes after a scramble, the referee consulting his umpires and the goal given, back to a two point game. Kilcullen responded with two more frees as they were back five in front on 42 minutes. good defensive work from Dónall Hanley and Cawley setting up Joe McHugh who was fouled, Kilcullen pointing, Ballinasloe in need of another goal which did come.

Craig Keighery doing well under pressure and kicking the ball into the net, again back to a two point game and a cracker for any neutrals watching.

Kilcullen added another foul with Coughlan then sending over a fantastic point from play after a pass from Fogarty. O'Hanlon added another free as two

EASKEY have won back to back Provincial deciders after a big battle with Ballinasloe in Bekan.

The Sea Blues marched the whole way to the All-Ireland final in Croke Park in January 2023 and they are on course to return to GAA Headquarters once again after overcoming a strong Galway side.

Managers Michael Conway, Enda Moylan and Brian Healy were all delighted at the full-time whistle as Easkey won back to back titles, no mean feat by any means.

Michael praised the entire team for eking out the win. Speaking to the press afterwards he said it was a classic game; "Yeah, it was fairly close there in the second half with their goals but in fairness to our lads, they reacted well every time they got a goal.

"Especially in the last five minutes there, I thought we fought really hard, we had turnovers for overcarrying that Andy put over the bar and it was a great workrate."

He said his side possibly weren't playing at their best but there was no fault in their workrate.

"On reflection, we probably didn't play our best.

"But to be honest they didn't die, the workrate was there, some of the points and the scoring, free flowing hurling that we normally have wasn't there, but the

workrate was there and that's what stood to us in the end," he said.

Joint manager Enda Moylan said Ballinasloe really put it to them but the experience of being in games such as these stood to the Easkey lads.

"They gave us a very tight game and I think the experience stood to the lads. They were here before, they know what was wanted and the two goals at the start of the second half could have been a downfall for another team but it wasn't for us.

"The boys dug in and they knew what they had to do. Missed a few scores but they all dug deep and they all put in a big performance."

There were huge performances from Finnian Cawley, Rory McHugh and Andy Kilcullen to name a few but Moylan said it was about the team of players as a group.

"All of the guys stood up, every man of the field. It was a team performance and they all dug deep and they all knew what was required.

"This Ballinasloe team were here for one reason, they wanted to win.

"They wanted to go to Croke Park.
"We have been there before and we want to go there again.

"We played here last year, played against Ballygar and it was a totally different game, totally different day. Today was a good day for good, open hardy hurling and there was good hitting out there.

"At the end of the day, the lads to a man just stood up as a team they really pushed it on. They could have wilted there with the two goals."

This Easkey team despite being young

show admirable maturity on the field.

"They are a young team, the oldest is 26 years of age. They were talking about the Ballinasloe lads being young but we are a very young team. There are guys there with huge maturity, great leaders on the field and off the field.

"They deliver when you want them and that's what you want and I have to say they gave a great performance."

Michael added that the week previous there was disappointment for the west Sligo club's footballers who were beaten in the semi-final but the lads regrouped and focused on the game.

"St Farnan's I know they got relegated in Senior, but they had a long season as well. These fellas were playing in Croke Park in January and a lot of them were back in with the county a week after the All-Ireland final, either with the footballers, Mikey and Finnian or all the hurlers.


"They are going since Croke Park essentially and I'm delighted that they got their reward here today.

"They have put in serious sacrifices down through the year and it was disappointing on the football last week, played reasonably well and left a few scores behind us but it's good to be back up to Senior next year as well," Michael added.

BACK-TO-BACK defending champions Sarsfields of Galway moved on to yet another AIB All-Ireland club senior camogie championship final after battling past Sarsfields of Cork in Mallow.

Seeking three-in-a-row All-Ireland titles against Dicksboro of Kilkenny on December 17, they are clearly hungry for more, and it was their superb second-half showing that ensured their progress.

A brace of goals from Siobhán McGrath and Klara Donohue at the threequarter mark were vital to the outcome.

After a mere 30 seconds, player-ofthe-match Klara Donohue and Clodagh McGrath nudged Sarsfields of Galway into an early advantage. Those opening stages suggested the Connacht side were up for the fight.

Lucy Allen, who took over the freetaking from the absent Kate Fennessy due to illness (she was introduced in the second-half), put her side on the scoreboard in the third minute from a '45.

But, the Galway team's desire shone through once more, and by the quarter hour mark they were 0-5 to 0-2 ahead.

A worry for them though was a leg injury picked up by their captain and full-back Laura Ward, who appeared to run it off over the hour.

Sarsfields of Cork worked their way back into the game, and with five minutes to go to half-time, fine individual scores from Hollie Herlihy, Lucy Allen (free) and Orlaith Mullins left it a one-point match, 0-6 to 0-5.

Defiant defending it must be said too from the Cork club's back line, denying Shannon Corcoran a chance at goal.

Both sides were being penalised by referee Ray Kelly for illegal hand-passes, the Kildare whistler was very strict on this rule.

In the four minutes of added time, Caoimhe Kelly from an extremely tight angle, and Lucy Allen from a '45, exchanged white flags to leave the bare minimum between them after a closely fought opening half, 0-7 to 0-6 in favour of Sarsfields of Galway.

Klara Donoghue restarted the secondhalf just like she did the first, and then Siobhán McGrath, who had a great duel with Lucy Kelly, her low drive was pushed

out for a '45 by Molly Lynch - but they got no return from the placed ball.

LAURA WARD knows Croke Park pretty well now. She knows what it's like to win and lose there, with club and county and returns to HQ on Sunday week, December 17 as captain of the Sarsfields team that attempts to complete an AIB All-Ireland senior club championship three-inarow.

As long-serving manager Michael 'Hopper' McGrath revealed however, they have first-hand knowledge of the challenge Dicksboro will provide.

Ward is an inspirational figure for the champions and there was considerable concern when she went down injured in the first half but she recovered to provide her trademark calm and assured performance in defence, as Sarsfields saw off their namesakes representing Cork and Munster, by 2-10 to 1-6 in Mallow on Saturday.

"The magic spray did the job and got us through," joked Ward when speaking to Galway Bay FM after the game. "The girls were brilliant and we needed everyone to get us over the line.

"It's unreal to be back in another All-

Ireland final. The scoreline doesn't show it but it was an absolute dogfight, up and down the field and we're just delighted to be back in an All-Ireland."

It was 0-7 to 0-6 at half-time and all to play for. Siobhán McGrath's 42nd minute goal opened some daylight for the Galway girls but Kate Fennessy responded two minutes later to give the Leesiders hope.

Clara Donohue put an exclamation mark on an excellent performance with another goal for the westerners and they held out from there.

"Clara has hurled so well for us all year," said Ward of the player that provided the definitive score. "It was massive and a well-deserved goal for her. It was brilliant for her to get the end result as she sets up so much as well. The forwards worked so hard, there was no easy ball coming down on top of us (in defence). It was brilliant.

"A lot of people say they're best friends and what not, but we honestly are a group of best friends. We get on so well. We've been together all the way up along. And when you're going out there on the pitch with a group of best friends like that, you don't want to let them down. You're going out to try your best. You do it for each

other and you keep going."

That spirit is a key element of the team's success according to the manager, although he admitted that his charges were far from perfect, perhaps due to a six-week break since the county final.

"There were times in that game it seemed to be going away from us but I think we put in a great second-half performance," McGrath noted

"We picked up a bit in the second half. Maybe at the start, we did leave players isolated, weren't quick enough in to support at times and maybe that comes from not playing games from the last five or six weeks. One thing you're always getting from the girls is fierce work rate. We done some silly things but I suppose their character and will to win shone through in the finish.

"There were seven points in it for a finish but whether we were seven points better than them is open to question. They missed a few goals in the last four or five minutes but it was all about getting over the line and getting a ticket to the final.

"We know we've a huge challenge against Dicksboro in the final. We played them earlier on in the year, before the championship stared. At that stage we'd a

fierce Dicksboro test

full outfit and they beat us seven or eight points in a challenge. They're massive, they're a mature team and we know they're probably the team that's standing out in this campaign all along.

"When you have to come down into the middle of (the opposition), down into their territory and they had fierce support, and there were times when we probably thought we didn't get the rub of the green out there as well... Between the jigs and the reels, when it's all over, it's lovely to get a win down here."

In their semi-final at Donaghmore Ashbourne, Dicksboro overturned a five-point interval deficit to book their first appearance in the decider and the first for any Kilkenny team since, ironically given what will be at stake, St Lachtain's completed their three-in-a-row in 2006.

A goal from the outstanding Caitrin Dobbin put last year's runners-up, Loughgiel Shamrocks in the box seat at half-time but they only managed two points in the second half, while Asha McHardy pounced for two goals to propel the 'Boro into the decider on a 2-13 to 1-10 scoreline.

The junior B final will be between Crossmaglen Rangers (Armagh) and St Munna's (Westmeath) at NGDC Abbotstown on December 16. Cross were far too strong for Roscommon Gaels in their semi-final, leading by 3-7 to 0-2 at half-time before cruising to a 7-12 to 1-3 success.

WHEN joint-captains Ava Lambert and Lisa Scahill raised the Rose Nixon Cup. to rapturous applause from family and supporters, it was a mark that something special had just unfolded in the Air Dome at the Connacht GAA Centre of Excellence in Bekan. An impressive Westport outfit produced an exhibition of camogie throughout the sixty minutes, to be crowned Connacht junior club champions in an historic first for the club.

If ever there was a complete performance, this was it. A young team who were disciplined, extremely well organised and focused, were a step ahead of their Carnmore opponents throughout. From the moment the sliothar was thrown in, Westport set about dismantling the opposition in what was to prove a powerful performance from start to finish.

The opening quarter saw the teams trade scores, with Westport just edging it by a single point thanks to scores from player of the match Fionnula McLaughlin, Meabh Tunney and Lisa Scahill. In the 16th minute however, a well-taken goal from Ava Lambert seemed to spark a reaction from the Carnmore girls. The revival proved somewhat shortlived though, and a further goal and two points from lively midfielder Fionnuala McLaughlin added further to the first-half supremacy of the girls in blue.

At the interval, Westport led by 2-5 to 0-6, and with just two of Carnmore's scores coming from play it was obvious a diligent Westport defensive unit were to the fore. Goalkeeper Ruth Crowley was


